





Mornings in Jenin by Susan Abulhawa (2011)

Palestine, 1948. A mother clutches her six-month old son as Israeli soldiers march through the village of Ein Hod. In a split second, her son is snatched from her arms and the fate of the Abulheja family is changed forever. Forced into a refugee camp in Jenin and exiled from the ancient village that is their lifeblood, the family struggles to rebuild their world. Their stories unfold through the eyes of the youngest sibling, Amal, the daughter born in the camp: the eldest son who loses everything in the struggle for freedom and the stolen son who grows up as an Israeli.

Life after Life by Kate Atkinson (2013)

What if you had the chance to live your life again and again. until you finally got it right? During a snowstorm in England in 1910, a baby is born and dies before she can take her first breath. What if there were an infinite number of chances to live your life? Would you eventually be able to save the world from its own inevitable destiny? Life After Life follows Ursula Todd as she lives through the turbulent events of the last century again and again. With wit and compassion, Kate Atkinson finds warmth even in life's bleakest moments. and shows an extraordinary ability to evoke the past.






City of Bohane by Kevin Barry (2012)




Gold by Chris Cleave (2013)




Six years by Harlan Coben (2013)

While his father searches for justice, Joe becomes frustrated with the investigation and sets out with his trusted friends to get some answers of his own. Their quest takes them first to the Round House, a sacred space and place of worship. A powerful and deeply humane story of a young boy thrown into an unjust adult world.




Going Back by Rachael English (2013)



These case studies are all based on actual people. While factually true, they demonstrate a novelist's empathetic understanding of the human mind. This extraordinary book is about one ordinary process: talking, listening and understanding.

Thick & Thin by Sarah Harte (2013)

Marianne Dillon and Clare McMahon are friends for twentyfive years but when a life-altering crisis hits their relationship - a crisis that involves their husbands, children and indeed the lives they have created the crack that was there all along tears them apart. Each must face catastrophe without the support of the best friend she would always turn to. Is it possible that a relationship that was so central to their lives was built on sand? And can they rescue something from the wreckage? An intelligent novel which encapsulates some universal truths about families. friendship and what we value.


Snow Child by Eowyn Ivey (2012)

But in this beautiful, violent place things are rarely as they appear, and what they eventually learn will transform all of them.



Harold Fry, nips out one morning, convinced that he must deliver a letter to an old love in order to save her. Leaving his bitter wife hoovering upstairs, he has no idea that he is about to walk from one end of the country to the other. So without hiking boots or map, he begins his unlikely pilgrimage across the English countryside.

All he knows is that he must keep walking. Along the way, strangers stir up memories, often painful, of a time when his marriage was filled with promise. Ironically, his wife, shocked by her husband's sudden absence, begins to long for his presence



The fall of the Stone City by Ismail Kadare (2012)

1943: German soldiers advance on the ancient gates of Gjirokaster, Albania. An act of rebellion leaves the citizens fearful of a bloody counter-attack. However, the Nazi Colonel, once a school friend of local dignitary, Doctor Gurameto, greets his former classmate warmly: in return. **Doctor Gurameto** invites him to dinner.

The next day, the army disappear from the city. The dinner at Gurameto's house changes the course of events in 20th century Europe. But as the citizens celebrate their hero, a conspiracy surfaces which leads some to place Gurameto at the heart of a plot to undermine Socialism.



Obsessed : Inside Padraig Harrington's head by Paul Keane

Even after winning three majors and becoming the heirapparent to Tiger Woods, Padraig Harrington still decided his game was not good enough. His quest was to become more than just a champion and the story of his obsession is told by his many friends and opponents.

This is an essential compendium for Harrington fans and students of the game with even a passing interest in what makes a great sportsman tick. It's a fine effort that brings the memories, good and bad, flooding back.



Magnificently told by each of the five characters in turn, this is a novel of simmering passion, betrayal and secret violence beneath a polished and fragile facade.


A delicate truth by John Le Carré (2013)

A compelling and atmospheric novel.




Red Sky in Morning by Paul Lynch (2013)




Close My Eyes by Sophie McKenzie (2013)


Where Have You Been? By Joseph O'Connor (2012)

A powerfully moving, entertaining and life-affirming read.





Beautiful ruins by Jess Walter (2013)

A set in 1960s Italy and a modern Hollywood studio.

The story begins in 1962. Somewhere on a rocky patch of the sun-drenched Italian coastline a young innkeeper, chest-deep in daydreams, looks out over the incandescent waters of the Ligurian Sea and views an apparition: a beautiful woman, a vision in white, approaching him on a boat.

The story continues in Hollywood, when an elderly Italian man shows up on a movie studio's back lot searching for the woman he last saw at his hotel fifty years before.
